SYLLABUS

The course aims to examine and analyze Trade theory regarding International Trade. In the First Part, the basic models of International Trade are examined, namely Ricardo's Comparative Advantage, the Specific Factors of Production developed by Samuelson and Jones, the Heckscher-Ohlin Model economic theory, as well as, the standard trade model. Then, we examine what happens when there are internal or external economies of scale regarding the production process.

Part Two explores the operation and effects of the most basic instruments of trade policy (tariffs, quotas, export subsidies, etc.), examines various issues such as:

- the arguments for and against international trade,
- provides a historical review of international negotiations on International Trade
- examines various forms of economic unions between countries related to their international economic relations,
- and finally refers to the trade policy and problems of developing countries as well as to the strategic trade policy of developed countries.
